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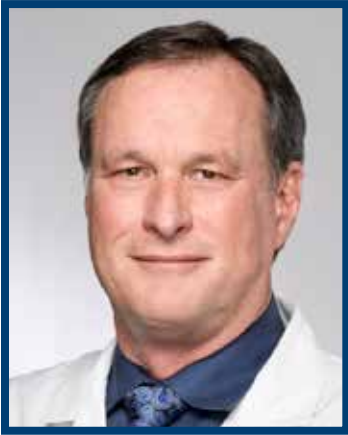


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A Message from the CCMS President

Gary Swain, M.D., Board President



As we have just reached the end of another Medical Society fiscal year, I want to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued membership in CCMS. Our organization has grown in numbers over the last few years and stood at 755 at the end of March. Despite this growth, at the time of writing this more than 30 members have yet to renew

their membership in 2024. We would like to encourage those who have not renewed to consider rejoining. Please do so by May 31st to be included in the next Physician Directory.

While this year has been calmer than recent years, which dealt with many issues, including a global pandemic, hurricanes, and other matters creating barriers to our ability as physicians to provide quality care to our patients, we continue to face several challenging and ongoing problems, such as inadequate Medicare reimbursements, a cumbersome prior authorization process, and an overall shortage of physicians in Collier County. The Florida Medical Association (FMA) addresses many of these challenges on the state level.

Your CCMS Board of Directors is preparing to attend the FMA Annual Meeting August 2-4, to review, discuss, and vote on resolutions submitted to the FMA by component medical societies. This is an opportunity for your voice to be heard at the state level. Any resolutions you would like to have considered by the FMA this year should be submitted to CCMS Executive Director April Donahue by May 24 so that our board can approve them and forward them to the FMA in time for inclusion in the Annual Meeting Handbook Addendum. April has guidelines for how resolutions should be structured, and the board will help in editing. Keep in mind the mission of CCMS is to serve the needs of our physician members so they can better serve the needs of the community. Any ideas on how your FMA can help with that would be an appropriate subject for a resolution.

In past years, the FMA and the FMA Political Action Committee (PAC) have been successful in several legislative initiatives. The Live Healthy Bill has recently addressed several issues, including the Florida Reimbursement Assistant for Medical Education (FRAME) program. This program will provide eligible practitioners with 25% of their principal loan amount per year for up to 4 years with a maximum award of \$150,000. The Live Healthy Bill also appropriated an additional \$62 million (\$92 million total) for 880 new residency slots for Florida. Another program created under the Live Healthy Bill

is the Training, Education, and Clinicals in Health (TEACH) funding program. This program provides qualified facilities with funding to offset costs associated with establishing, maintaining, or expanding clinical training programs. These programs as well as the Graduate Assistant Physician program seek to reduce the physician shortage and lead to improved access to care.

The FMA successfully attempted to restrict the scope of practice expansion for non-physicians by defeating several bills, including one allowing Naturopaths to practice as physicians and having prescriptive authority. Also defeated was a bill that allowed psychologists to have prescriptive authority. With the support of the FMA, other bills allowing Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists and Psychiatric Nurse Practitioners to practice autonomously without a physician protocol were also defeated. Bills to promote the scope of practice expansion seem ongoing, and only through supporting legislators who understand the issues can the FMA continue to support its physician members. Membership in the FMA and the FMA PAC provides resources to continue this effort.

While the FMA had several successes this legislative session, some initiatives did not become law. The Tort Reform Bill, the bill addressing Restrictive Covenants with Physicians, and the Corporate Practice of Medicine bills did not pass. I anticipate these issues will be seen again in the future.

The CCMS Physician Wellness Program is one of the CCMS priorities in attempting to serve our physicians. This program, which provides confidential, cost-free counseling services to members, continues to be highly successful. We have provided 34 sessions for members through March of this year, with annual sessions ranging from 69 in 2018 to 146 total sessions last year.

After a multi-year sabbatical, the much-loved Physician Talent show returned, thanks to the hard work and efforts of many. The show was well attended, raising funds for the Foundation of CCMS, the Neighborhood Health Clinic, and the Physician Led Access Network. For their efforts in organizing this event, Drs. Erik Hiester, Nina Korunda, and Rebecca Smith have been named recipients of the CCMS President's Award this year. They will be recognized at the upcoming CCMS annual meeting on June 15th.

Finally, I encourage all of you to attend the Annual Meeting where we will install your new Board of Directors including President Dr. Zubin Pachori, provide fellowship with other members, and recognize the outstanding efforts of our Physician of the Year, Dr. Corey Howard.

15th Annual Women's Health Forum "Fit & Fabulous You: Today & Beyond" a Resounding Success

As part of its ongoing efforts to be a health resource for residents and visitors in Collier County, Collier County Medical Society and the Foundation of CCMS were pleased to host the 15th Annual Women's Health Forum, a free health education event for the public, on Saturday, March 23, 8:30am-12:45pm at the Naples United Church of Christ.

More than 300 participants at this popular event enjoyed breakout sessions with educational talks from 23 CCMS member physicians; an exhibit hall with 24 vendors that offered resources, products, and solutions for women; and healthy refreshments, with 22 volunteers and staff helping to make the event possible.

"We are grateful for another successful Women's Health Forum that provided a wellspring of tailored medical education to our attendees," said committee chair Dr. Catherine Kowal. "Thank you to the dedicated physician speakers for their invaluable contributions to the community as well as to all supporters whose generosity enabled us to raise \$6,550 for our Foundation."

The Forum, with the theme "Fit & Fabulous You: Today & Beyond" focused on helping attendees develop a deeper understanding of their health and what it takes to become more "fit & fabulous". The presentations were designed to strengthen attendees' wellness skills so they achieve their healthcare goals today and beyond, and included innovations in women's health, new medical technologies, and important developments in women's preventive care.

Presenters were carefully selected by the physician members of the Women's Health Forum Committee. Breakout session topics were chosen based on value and impact on women's health and included: Aesthetics, Arthritis, Brain & Spine Health, Breast Cancer, Gastroenterology, Fitness, Heart & Vascular Health, Joint Replacement, Hormone Replacement Therapy, Osteoporosis, Pain Management, Weight Loss, and more. Each presentation had a dedicated physician Q&A session allowing attendees time to gain a deeper understanding of the topic.

Each year the Forum also enables CCMS to donate funds to its charitable Foundation, to help provide scholarships for future medical professionals and support for local healthcare programs in need. Contributions from event sponsors and exhibitors, plus donations from attendees make this support possible. Attendee donations at the door totaled \$1,550, and CCMS is donating \$5,000 of the sponsor and exhibitor fees. The Palace Waves Back – A Recollection

It feels like just a few short weeks since I received that weighty letter bearing the news of my nomination for an MBE from King Charles of England.

The missive, complete with royal seal, sought confirmation that I was willing to accept the award, and asked that I keep the matter confidential until the

official announcement was made by the Crown.

In suspended disbelief, excitement, and pride, I took a step back, a deep breath, and a quiet moment to absorb this news that my name was actually on the King's 2023 Birthday Honors List.

It could have been one of those cinematic sequences when the hero's journey scrolls by at stunning speed: Born in St Lucia, former British colony, independence in 1979, rapid social and economic change, migration for greater opportunity, university graduation, New York, New Jersey, Naples... then me.

Like most former colonies across the British Commonwealth, it was a pretty big deal when any royal person visited our island. Public holidays, pronouncements and parades were the norm, along with uniformed school-children lining city streets, waving with island excitement. Now it seemed the Palace was finally waving back with an invitation to tea and truffles and trophies.

It was a small struggle to stay calm and dignified, but I managed to remain as level-headed as possible while serving this news to family and friends. Happily, they were not all familiar with the details of an MBE Award, so as the latest prospective recipient, I took some pains to explain.

The acronym stands for Member of the Order of the British Empire, as established by King George V in 1917. It is conferred on exemplars who achieve lasting impact in their fields of work, study, or civic service to community. My particular award was for humanitarian service to my homeland, Saint Lucia.

Though my investiture was still months away, I was nervous about preparing for the grand event. Clearly, flying to England, literally to see the King, would be one of my most memorable moments.

No Cinderella syndrome for me, but lots of excitement all the same. I was abuzz with questions: when to fly, what to wear, where to stay, who to invite, and above all, what protocol at the Palace ...?

Then, it dawned on me that the Royals virtually invented pomp and ceremony and had been doing this for several centuries. No doubt, much of this detail would be revealed at the promised briefing two weeks before the event. All I had to do meanwhile, was still my beating heart.

On January 31, as I entered the surreal surroundings of Buckingham Palace, I felt like the personification of the Commonwealth itself. Here I was, seated among many other deserving honorees from around the world, arrayed in all our diversity. As we were ushered into the Music Room for the imminent investiture, I took in the grandeur of the space and its long histories of controversial conquest.

We had been forewarned that Her Royal Highness, Princess Ann would stand in for her brother Charles who had been absented by a medical matter of some yet undisclosed delicacy.

So it was, that Princess Ann and I came to converse for all of three minutes about Saint Lucia, my philanthropic work and my impressions of contemporary London. Soon enough, my palpitations subsided, and I happily accepted the promised medal with a pride and presumed dignity.

Thankfully, that medal and these momentous memories, will long remind me of the need to continue my humanitarian work, and encourage others to serve their communities in any capacity they can.

Physician of the Year – Corey Howard, M.D.



The Physician of the Year Award honors a CCMS member who deserves special recognition for exemplary contributions to the practice of medicine and/or outstanding

service to our community. Medical Society members submit nominations to the CCMS board, who this year selected Dr. Howard, as nominated by Dr. Catherine Kowal.

Dr. Howard has served as Chair of the Florida Medical Association's delegation to the American Medical Association for the past 14 years and works with state medical societies, specialty medical societies, young physicians, residents/fellows, and medical students to craft national policies that guide our profession. He played a vital role in advocating for Medicare Payment reform to the AMA to become one of its top priorities after many years of coalition building and dedicated work. To date, this year's planned Medicare cuts have been reduced by over half.

"I am deeply honored to receive this prestigious award from CCMS. Throughout my career, I have been committed to supporting fellow physicians in navigating the intricacies of healthcare policy at both state and national levels," said Dr. Howard. "I could not have done this without the support of the CCMS throughout my career. I firmly believe that there is still much to be accomplished, particularly in addressing the shortcomings of the Medicare Payment system. The preservation and advancement of private medical practice are crucial for both our profession and the well-being of our patients. It is my sincere hope that our colleagues will join in advocating for the future of our profession."

Dr. Howard embodies the essence of a dedicated physician leader, committed to excellence in patient care and advancing healthcare policy. With nearly three decades of experience as a practicing physician, including his recent role as a concierge physician, Dr. Howard has consistently championed patient welfare, medical innovation, and transformative healthcare initiatives.

Together, they cherish moments of adventure and relaxation at their home in Park City, indulging in pursuits like mountain biking, skiing, golfing, and simply reveling in the beauty of life's simple pleasures.

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Reporting Requirement Likely Applies to Most Medical Practices that do Business as a Corporation or LLC

Congress passed the Corporate Transparency Act on a bipartisan basis. This law creates a new beneficial ownership information (“BOI”) reporting requirement as part of the U.S. government’s efforts to make it harder for bad actors to hide or benefit from their ill-gotten gains through shell companies. A business which qualifies as a

“Reporting Company” needs to file the BOI Application this year if the entity(ies) were filed before 2024 and anytime there is a change of beneficial owners or addresses.

If an entity is a Reporting Company and was or is filed after January 1, 2024, but before January 1, 2025, then it will need to file the BOI Application within 90 days after the entity is formed. If the entity is formed AFTER January 1, 2025, then the BOI Application must be filed within 30 days of creation of the entity. There are 23 types of businesses exempt from reporting. The definitions of a Reporting Company and those exemptions are in the Small Business Guide which can be found at [FinCEN.gov/BOI](https://fincen.gov/BOI). FinCEN’s BOI webpage also provides a Small Entity Compliance Guide; Answers to Frequently Asked Questions; and an introductory video.

There is a good probability that most medical practices who do business through a corporation or limited liability company will need to file a BOI Application. However, some entities may meet the exemption for a large operating company if all six of the criteria required apply to the entity. Thus, all medical practices should review the Small Business Guide and comply if an exception is not met.

If a practice has more than one entity, a BOI Application would likely need to be done for all entities, i.e. if there is an entity for the practice and one to own a building, then file for both. The willful failure to timely report complete or updated ownership information to FinCEN or provide false or fraudulent information may result in civil or criminal penalties, including civil penalties of \$500 per day that the violation continues or criminal penalties including imprisonment up to 2 years and/or a fine of up to \$10,000.

To be prepared to file the BOI Application, the following information should be gathered for each entity: Full legal name; Tradename or DBA (if any); Employer Identification Number; Business address; Owners’ (members’ or shareholders’) names,

dates of birth, residential addresses, and the same information for the Applicant of the Reporting Company (including a copy of the Applicant’s driver’s license). There are several other types of Proof of Identity if any of the individuals do not have a driver’s license. The Applicant information is not necessary if the Reporting Company was formed before January 1, 2024.

Tips For Filing an Online BOI Application:

Read the Small Business Guide. It has easy to read definitions, instructions, and a good chart to ascertain if an entity needs to report. To find the Small Business Guide, go to [FinCEN.gov/BOI](https://fincen.gov/BOI) and click on the blue block on the left side that reflects Small Business Resources and choose Small Business Guide and review it. After you review the Guide, gather the information, and download the drivers’ licenses needed, completing the Application should only take about 30 minutes. Do not stop and close a partial application without filing or info may be lost and then needs re-entered.

Next, file online by choosing File BOI E-filing on the top right of the Small Business Resources page. When completing the Application, leave the dash that is in your EIN out of the form. When moving forward to the next page, at the bottom right corner, hit the blue “NEXT”. To go back pages, hit the blue “PREVIOUS” tab. Do not try to use the arrow keys or information may be lost. Download the drivers’ licenses to be dragged into the Application when asked to do so. When the application is submitted if advised that there were incomplete section(s), just hit PREVIOUS to see the sections with a red square around them and complete them. When the Application is complete, a confirmation will appear. Download it for the Reporting Company’s File.

Alert: FinCEN has been notified of recent fraudulent attempts to solicit information from individuals and entities who may be subject to reporting requirements under the Corporate Transparency Act. The fraudulent correspondence may be titled “Important Compliance Notice” and asks the recipient to click on a URL or to scan a QR code. Those e-mails or letters are fraudulent. FinCEN does not send unsolicited requests. Please do not respond to these fraudulent messages, click on any links, or scan any QR codes within them.

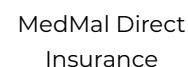

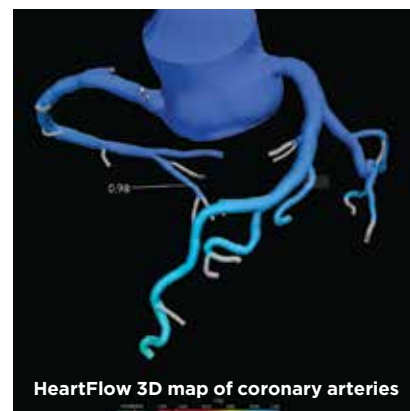
